Where You Might Work


Being a Sports Centre Manager gives jobseekers a chance to work in their sport of choice. For example, those who love golf could become golf course managers, while others who may enjoy tennis could be tennis club managers. Other places of work could include:

- > Bowling alleys.
- > Public and private pools.
- Basketball, volleyball, and squash associations that own courts.
- > Professional sports stadiums.
- Any sporting club or organisation that owns or rents recreation areas.



Key Responsibilities

Sports Centre Managers will undergo different tasks every day. Some recurring jobs may include:



- > Marketing the facility to promote and attract clients.
- Scheduling competitions for the facility.
- > Selecting, supervising, and training staff.
- > Ensuring proper maintenance of the facilities and making sure they conform to safety standards.
- > Planning and organising catering inside the facility.


The Attributes and Skills You Will Need

Sports Centre Managers have a hands-on role that requires them to be a noticeable figure-head inside a facility while also getting work done behind the scenes in their offices. This requires them to have attributes such as:

- Strong communication skills, both in-person and digitally.
- > Strong leadership skills and a desire to lead.
- > Being well-versed in traditional and digital literacy.
- Sound knowledge of applications such as Word, PowerPoint, and Excel.
- Good knowledge of the sport and recreation activities that are performed in the facility you wish to manage.
- > Prior management experience or a formal qualification listed below.
